From glorious summer to winter's discontents

Despite all the gloomy prognostications, the Olympics and Paralympics were a huge success – and it was good to be in London while they were on. Around the Barbican there are good things in prospect for autumn too: the new cinemas will be open in the next few weeks, the shop in Lauderdale Place is due to reopen – and the underfloor heating will be on. But as usual, there's a clutch of issues to grapple with.

Cinemas

The unfinished business on the cinemas relates to sound monitoring. The cinemas had to move from Forbisher Crescent because it was impossible to sound proof them adequately. The design of the new cinemas (a "box in a box") should ensure that they are sound proof; and testing in residents' flats was done in early September to set the threshold level of sound in the cinemas so that it could not be heard in flats.

We don't doubt that the Arts Centre will keep below that threshold, but from the outset we have sought an active sound monitoring system that could detect whether the acoustic

integrity of the cinemas had been breached. That's not what has been installed, however:

the plan is for regular reviews (repeating the testing in residents' flats), or reviews if there is a complaint. We've been arguing that it would make sense to have sensors outside the cinemas and on the structure of Ben Jonson House so that breaches of sound proofing (most likely to happen by accident – probably in a few years' time) could be easily detected. We are still in discussion about this.

One forum for that discussion is a useful quarterly meeting between the chairman of the Arts Centre Board and the BA and the immediately neighbouring houses, to discuss issues that arise from living next to the arts centre. Issues discussed so far have included the management of nuisance generally, buses running their engines in Silk Street, and the extractor fans over the kitchens. These meetings replace the old quarterly residents' meetings, so the Arts Centre is also planning

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to host a couple of meetings a year to which all residents will be invited, and where the Arts Centre will talk about its forthcoming programme and other cultural activities.

One constructive outcome of the new meetings with the Arts Centre is recognising where we have common ground and can support each other: an example has been the zebra crossings in Silk Street and Moor Lane, which both the Arts Centre and the BA wanted. As you have probably seen from a recent letter, these are about to be installed. Expect another consultation soon from the Highways Department on improving the Beech Street/Silk street junction.

Protecting the listed building status

The cinema contractors were about to install galvanised steel bike racks outside the cinemas, but our ever vigilant honorary secretary, Robert Barker, pointed out that the Barbican Estate Listed Management guidelines, which have only just been reviewed and re-endorsed, lists the acceptable materials

and colours to use on the estate – and galvanised steel isn't one them. We hope that the racks, when installed, will be black.

Another neighbour – this time the Girls School – has been talking to the BA and nearby houses about its proposals to extend its main hall by filling in the "moat" space that sits outside the south side of the hall, below the level of St Giles' Terrace. The plan includes a green and glass roof. The school has now sent out its proposals for general consultation throughout the estate.

Meanwhile, another BA group continues to consider the concrete inspections and remedial work to the tower blocks (soon to be repeated on the terrace blocks). Cripplegate wardmote passed a motion earlier in the year arguing that the concrete inspections revealed structural defects and that therefore the City (as freeholder) should bear the costs of rectifying these. A response to that motion went to Barbican Residential Committee at the end of September, but we asked the BRC to defer considering it until the BA's

concrete working party has had time to consider this issue further. The report to the BRC referred to previous reports in 1986 and 1991, so we've asked to see these and will consider all the reports alongside the legal advice we've received.

St Alphage

Tim Macer describes (below) the meeting we had with the project manager for Brookfield and Oxford Properties, the developers who have taken over the St Alphage site. Brookfield is planning to use Make's original design, for which planning permission was given, and the project manager emphasised that Brookfield itself would both build and run the buildings. He was keen to emphasise Brookfield's desire for good long term relationships with all their neighbours.

Air quality

The BA's sustainability committee arranged a meeting with the City's chairman of policy and resources and the brand new town clerk to discuss air quality. The City, along with Westminster and Camden, is lobbying the London Mayor to reduce pollution from taxis and buses, and, following the interest in this topic at this year's AGM, we were keen to support the City in this work. We learnt that the City is doing research into the effects on vehicle emissions of a 20 mph speed limit. To read more on this issue, see Sarah Hudson's piece on page 4.

Finally, if you would like to get involved in the BA and have a head for figures, we are looking for someone to assist the treasurer with managing the invoices for Barbican Life. Do get in touch – about this, or any other issue where the BA can help.

St Alphage: All change and no change

It was Hammerson that applied for, and obtained planning permission for the redevelopment of St Alphage House site in June last year. With a rather visible lack of progress, Hammerson had told the BA that it was waiting for a pre-let before it started work. Then, this July, Hammerson announced it was disposing of its City office property portfolio to Brookfield Office Properties, a Canadian developer. Initially, St Alphage was not in the deal: then suddenly it was, and Brookfield was the new owner.

The BA has been in touch with the firm, and has now had an initial meeting with the project director at Brookfield to understand what this change will mean. We learnt that the development will actually be a 50/50 joint venture between Brookfield and Oxford Properties, an international property investment group, though Brookfield will be the partner that runs the development project. There are several interesting and potentially helpful key differences to the Hammerson deal.

First, Brookfield and its partner have actually bought the site outright from the City on a long lease. Secondly, Brookfield will do the build itself: it has its own building company. Thirdly, once let,

Brookfield will still manage and operate it. Our contact at Brookfield said this was focusing minds there on their long-term commitments to being good neighbours to us at the Barbican. He appeared well briefed on the importance of the highwalks, and said he intended to keep these open across the site for as long as possible into the construction phase – though at some point, cross-site access will be lost temporarily.

No significant changes to the scheme are planned, though. Any changes proposed are likely to be internal – such as making the space work better for possible tenants. However Brookfield will be retaining the same professional team, including the architects Make. This means the building, public realm and highwalks will eventually be built exactly as approved.

Building is not likely to start soon, however. The new owners are also awaiting a pre-let, though they may start to do some site clearance and demolition in advance. We will establish channels of communications and more regular meetings once work reaches that stage.

Working to improve air quality

Air quality continues to be a major issue, with the BA Chair writing to Mayor Boris and our GLA member, John Biggs, in support of the City's campaign to reduce air pollution from taxis and buses. The City, Westminster and Camden councils have asked Boris and TfL to take action on this key public health issue. In London over 4,000 premature deaths a year are attributed to poor air quality.

The main source of the fine particles and nitrogen dioxide pollutants is road traffic. In the City buses and taxis are major contributors to its poor air quality. The City and other councils are calling for black cabs older than 10 years to be retired and replaced by lower emission vehicles. They are also campaigning for buses to be fitted with effective NOx and particle suppressors. The Mayor has responded to both the City and the BA to say that in the next 4 years he will introduce 1,000 hybrid buses and a further 1,000 retro-fitted low emission buses. This amounts to about 20% of the bus fleet by 2016 – so there is some way to go.

The BA Sustainability group monitored taxis on streets round the Barbican in July before the Olympics started. We found that over 30% of taxis were over 10 years old. These vehicles are likely to be the highest polluters, as they only have to conform to Euro 2 or earlier standards on emissions. Replacement taxis would have to meet the more rigorous Euro 5 standard. We also identified that at certain times of day taxis plying for hire (i.e. with their lights on) were the largest single group vehicles on the road.

For example, in Aldersgate Street in the evening, every third vehicle was a taxi plying for hire – one every 17 seconds. It could be argued these vehicles are contributing disproportionately to the air and noise pollution for residents on the western side of the Barbican, Aldersgate Street and Little Britain. Looking at the results of an earlier study by the City, we found that the average gap between taxis during the day is down from 44 seconds in 2007 to 27 seconds today. Are we paying too high a price in terms of long term health issues for this convenience? Are there better ways to have easy access to taxis – such as more ranks or smarter ways to book or call cabs?

The BA Chair and members of the Sustainability group met Mark Boleat, the Chair of Policy and Resources committee and the new Town Clerk, John Barradell, at the end of September to find out what the City is doing to improve air quality and how residents can support this.

There are now links on the BA website to the **Air Quality Monitoring station** in Beech Street. So you can check on pollution

levels in the tunnel. There are also links to **AirText** so you can sign up to free air quality alerts and there is also a link to **Walkit.com** where you can find low pollution walking routes in London.

Carbon Footprint Calculator

Save thousands and cut your carbon footprint: Switch to a Car Club



Got stuff to shift? The zipvan awaits in the Bunyan carpark

Yes, it's true, you really can save a lot of money by switching to a car club such as Zip Car, or City Car Club. Stop incurring those nasty Barbican car space charges. Don't worry about the cost of petrol any more. Stop frantically paying the congestion charge at the last minute.

I signed up for Zip car last year and have a fleet of vehicles based in the Bunyan Court car park off Fann Street – an Audi A3 for running around, a VW Transporter for those domestic chores and a BMW to impress the mother-in-law. The fuel is included in the rental fee and so is the congestion charge. You book on line by the hour (around £6 to £10/hour) and there is nothing more to pay other than your annual membership fee of £60. There is generally a price cap on renting for a day or a weekend, making these car clubs as competitive as regular car hire companies such as Avis, Hertz, Enterprise, etc. City Car Club makes a similar offering to Zip Car and has a Fiat 500 and a Ford Focus nearby.

In contrast the AA's web site says 2013 motoring costs for a new average sized car costing £17,000 to £25,000 will be calculator includes the amount of carbon

around £8,400 assuming 15,000 annual mileage. Driving this car would also generate around 5 tonnes of CO₂ a year – excluding the amount of embedded carbon in buying a new car. Honda and Toyota estimate that building, distributing and eventually disposing of a car accounts for 2 to 4 tonnes of CO₂. So using a combination of public transport and car clubs, you'll likely save a four-figure sum and significantly reduce your carbon emissions. Since selling my 3.2 litre petrol guzzling Isuzu Trooper, motoring is costing me less than £1,500 per year.

And I find I want to use buses, tubes and trains much, much more. I have reduced my number of car journeys to about 2 per month. Sure, sometimes you just need a car. So, why wait? Check out these web sites:

Good co-operation promotes our security

The basis for the relatively high standard of security across the Barbican continues to owe much to the vigilance of residents and the close co-operation of the City of London Police (CoLP). The continuing close liaison of the CoLP and the Barbican Estate Office adds an extra layer of confidence to our sense of well-being. This is most noticeable at the meetings of the Barbican Estate Security Committee (BESC). As Chairman I am constantly impressed by the reports that come to my committee at each meeting from representatives of both organisations. These reports indicate that most issues are dealt with speedily and with little interruption to the lives of most residents.

Nevertheless, it is important to add to this close co-operation the manner in which my committee probe and exercise their influence over events that do arise that often are outside the remit of either the CoLP or the estate office. One such instance is the continuing developments around the periphery of the estate. The importance with which my committee is regarded may be indicated by the strength of the interested parties who have responded to our concerns about the tunnel that leads to the escalators at Moorgate station.

At the initial meeting eight people including Richard Storer, Community Relations Officer, Crossrail; Mark Williams, Community Relations Representative, BAM Nuttall Kier, Crossrail's contractors at Moorgate and their security personnel; Mervyn Smith, Senior Principal Surveyor, City Surveyors Department

and Bob Broughton, Technical Surveillance Officer, Department of Environmental Services, as well as John Bailey on behalf of BESC, were all present and after some heated discussion and the excellent negotiation skills of John Bailey, saw matters from our point of view and agreed to institute changes to the hoarding. It was agreed that these should focus upon improved lighting, CCTV, more effective reflective mirrors, getting Crossrail out-of-hours security guards to check the passageway during hours of darkness and to erect notices to this effect in appropriate places.

Added to this Mervyn Smith agreed to look at ways in which the escalators and the area around the top of the stairs might be made to look less like an extension of the Crossrail building site and more like a decent, clean and tidy introduction to the estate and the Barbican Centre. There has been a minimum of effort so far as that is concerned but we intend to pursue the matter so that the area will look and

feel more secure and, we hope, will set something of a precedent for other developments that impinge upon our homes and threaten resident safety.

My committee is satisfied with what has been accomplished so far as the approach to the escalators are concerned, especially as there is unlikely to be a change of circumstances around the area until new escalators are installed in two to three years' time somewhere to the south of the present site.

Since my last report, the committee have heard of many instances around the estate that reflect more normal criminal activities, but although police numbers were reduced during the Olympic games period there were no security lapses or increases in criminal activity across the estate. However, there was the first murder in the City for five years during the summer in Smithfield and phone and handbag thefts by moped riders and cyclists have been reported in Clerkenwell Road and Old Street areas prompting the CoLP to remind women in particular to remain observant when walking close to the curb.
